

The owner of the famous 1964 Aston Martin DB5 collided with 17-year-old Sydney Robertson, Miss Pennsylvania Teen USA 2014, and her mother just outside of Williamsburg, PA on Saturday evening.

The collision, involving the Aston Martin DB5 and the Robertson vehicle, a 2005 Kia Spectra, occurred at about 8 p.m. at the intersection of Route 27 and 851. Diane Robertson, 37, was driving west with her daughter on Route 27, and drove through a stop sign that had been removed by vandals. Due to poor visibility caused by rain and fog, the owner of the Aston Martin, Walter Scheckler, 70, proceeded through his own stop sign on Route 851, and crashed into the Robertson vehicle.

All were wearing seat belts except for Diane Robertson.

Sydney Robertson was transported from the scene by ambulance to Williamsburg Hospital, to receive care for a facial laceration and broken bones. Her mother, Diane, was taken to Williamsburg Hospital as well, but despite some bruising, she did not sustain any long-lasting injuries.

The Aston Martin on the other hand, did not fare well from the two-car collision; the front end of the vehicle was severely damaged.

Scheckler did not make any comment about the state of his vehicle, however, he appeared to be very distraught and informed the police that he would have the Aston Martin restored.

The well-known Aston Martin, having been used on the set of the early James Bond movies and "Goldfinger" and most recently in the new James Bond movie Skyfall, is valued at a whopping \$4.5 million.

As for Miss Pennsylvania Teen USA 2014, the facial laceration Sydney received from the accident did not fare well for her. When asked to comment on the state of her injuries, she cried,

"I look like a freak. My face will never be the same. My career as a model is over."

Fortunately for her, Sydney was well taken care of, and released from the hospital. Jon Greenaway, Communications Director at Williamsburg Hospital, commented on Miss Robertson's release:

"We are pleased to announce that Sydney Robertson's injuries turned out to be minor. She was released with a broken arm and a three inch cut on her face that was stitched."

Mrs. Robertson, despite her lack of injuries, did not leave the scene unscathed. When police arrived to the scene, they found open beer containers in the Robertson vehicle. When Robertson's BAC was tested, it was two times higher than the legal limit.

Diane Robertson will be charged with a DUI, her third this year.

The vandals that had stolen the stop sign from Route 27 were identified and charged.

PA State Trooper, Larry Lee, made it known the vandals would not be let off lightly.

“This fun and games almost cost some lives. We are going to make an example of these guys.”

All of the individuals are minors, so names will not be released.
